Youths lead police on wild chase

Six people - two as young as 15 - were chased through the streets of Mount Druitt and Blacktown in a stolen car earlier this morning, throwing folders and other stationery at police.

The pursuit ended half an hour later, with children hiding in backyards and under a car.

Police patrolling Richmond Road at Doonside about 12.30am saw a Holden Commodore driven by a 16-year-old disqualified driver. The car had been reported stolen from Rouse Hill on Wednesday.

After the car failed to stop, police began a pursuit that involved the dog squad, a police helicopter, and four other units.

"At least four vehicles, a dog squad vehicle and Polair were involved in the chase," a police spokesman, David Rose, said.

"It's safe to assume that there were items of personal documentation, like a folder, thrown from the vehicle. It was nothing too threatening, but obviously caused some concern."

The pursuit ended when a suspected mechanical failure caused the car to slow at Richmond Road. The car stopped, with the children dispersing into backyards, police said. At least one child hid under a car in an attempt to avoid arrest.

A 16-year-old boy from Tregear was later charged with car theft, driving while disqualified, driving in a dangerous manner and resisting arrest. He was refused bail and is due to appear in Cobham Childrens Court today.

Another boy, a 15-year-old from Airds, was charged with being carried in a stolen vehicle and was refused bail to appear in court today.

A 20-year-old man from Tregear, charged with being carried in a stolen vehicle, throwing an object and resisting arrest, was also refused bail. He is due in Mt Druitt Local Court later today.

Two women, a 15-year-old and a 20-year-old, both from Dubbo, were charged with being carried in a stolen vehicle and will appear in court on July 17. A 17-year-old Willmot boy will front the same charge on the same date.
